

For the last several months, attention has been directed to the declining balance in the treasury. After the very successful fundraiser in February, the balance was \$59,380.82. That balance also reflected several grants that we received from The Community Foundation after our financial crisis last fall. You can see that in seven months the balance has decreased \$21,427.31. Contributions have remained fairly steady, but with the increasing cost of food for filling the prepacked bags and the increase in the number of families served, it is urgent that the board begin to plan now for ways to curb this decline. The Valentine Extravaganza brought in a lot of money and was fun, but it required a great deal of work and organization by a lot of people and they are not going to do it again this year. Perhaps

a series of fundraisers sponsored by a church or club or by a couple of member churches together in our network could be considered. The Community Foundation will again sponsor The Great Community Give and we hope to participate in that again, but that is in the spring. We can't wait that long to be making plans. Besides, it is not wise to depend on this one event to solve our problem. On Friday, October 20, WRFP will participate in the Rotary Club's food drive for a number of food pantries, but it is organized very differently this year, and we have no idea how much food we will receive. Food Pantry Report Continued

We must remember that the pantry is reimbursed by the host church each month for the cost of eggs, and a generous donor has reimbursed us for the hamburger each month this year. These payments are included in the deposits in the treasurer's report. In November the Virginia Poultry Growers gives us turkey breasts for Thanksgiving, so there is no cost to the pantry for meat. However, it is our custom to give hams at Christmas. They had to be pre-ordered in July and we won't know the total cost until December. Last year the hams cost \$1,950.12.

This month the pantry served 89 families including the 8 deliveries on Thursday evening. Five of these were new to the pantry. In addition, 3 families received emergency bags, so we actually served 92 this month.

We were fortunate to receive 100 pounds of sausage from Pork for the Pantry--a program of the Farm Ministry--supported by both Rockingham County 4-H and FFA youth livestock programs. Families were given a pound of sausage and a pound of hamburger. And again, we thank our generous donor who continues to reimburse the pantry for the cost of the hamburger and Gary Simmons of Rawley Pike Meats who gives us a special price on this excellent quality hamburger. We thank the Mt. Clinton UMC for potatoes. For several years, they have planted a special patch of potatoes that they give to the pantry in the fall. So, each family received a five-pound bag of new potatoes. Approximately 2,416 pounds of food was given in the prepacked bags. Also, each family received the usual 12-count package of toilet paper, 2 dozen eggs, and a loaf of bread with large families receiving 2 loaves. And we thank Mt. Olive for 50+ boxes of cereal they collected in a special drive. That is

especially helpful since cereal is not only a good breakfast item but also can be a nutritious snack, and cereal is included in all the prepacked bags each month.

We thank Fairview COB for hosting the pantry this month. On Thursday, October 26, the Mt. Clinton UMC will host the pantry. They will provide 2-dozen eggs and an inspiration sheet for each family. Again, we will plan to serve 100.

A recent devotional in Our Daily Bread reminded readers that when there are problems, "When our minds are fixed on God, we can trust Him even in foggy and confusing times. We might not see it now, but if we trust God, we can be assured that His help is on the way." In the midst of our concern about funding the pantry, we must remember that this is God's pantry. He has guided us and has seen that we had what we needed from the time He planted the seed for it in Charlsie Miller's mind a little over 13 years ago. He is sending us more families who need our help, and He's not going to let us or these families down now. He knows how important this pantry is to people in our community. Thursday evening two ladies did not have transportation to the pantry, so they walked from Singers Glen to Cooks Creek! They trusted that their needs would be met. Sharon Showalter took them home, with their four bags of groceries and 5-pound bag of potatoes. We must put our faith to work as well as our minds and our efforts. We must remember the old saying, "Pray like everything depends on God and work like it depends on you."




