... We played with the idea of what Cooks Creek would look like if we took as our mission, individually and as a church, to disciple, baptize, and teach those around us. We would have an increasingly vibrant and exciting church with more people becoming disciples of Jesus and each person becoming a deeper disciple!

Here are some areas we can all (you and me!) be growing in as we reach our family, friends, neighbors, and guests for Jesus Christ:

What you can be:

A person who prays continuously (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18): Allow yourself to become aware of God’s activity all around you and be in communication with God all day. Pray that you would become a deeper disciple of Jesus and that God would point out who you should be praying for and inviting to worship.

A person who is bathed in the Word of God (2 Timothy 3:16-17): Allow yourself to become more entwined in the fullness of God’s Word often. Be a person who increasingly takes courage, rest, comfort, and wisdom from Scripture.

A welcoming, hospitable presence (Hebrews 13:2): People were excited to see Jesus. Not only because he healed people and performed miracles but because he genuinely welcomed people into his presence. I doubt he had to think of being welcoming, he was so welcoming that it be intrinsic to his personhood. May we be that way, too!

What you can do:

Be present (Hebrews 10:25): Your presence is important! Commit to being in worship. Commit to attending a Sunday School class – we have a wonderful and strong slate of options! Your presence at Cooks Creek is important and valuable. The more we are present the more the Holy Spirit can work on us as the Body of Christ and the more excited people will be to join with us.

Welcome those you don’t know (Romans 15:7): Welcoming each other is important. Welcoming those you

don’t know is way more important. Did you know that surveys show that the most awkward time for visitors is when they are sitting by themselves in the sanctuary waiting for worship to start? Invite anyone and any couple sitting alone to sit with you – whether they are brand new or have been here for years. Take the opportunity to genuinely get to know them.

Invite people to join you at church (Matthew 28:19-20): Sometimes, we build it up on our minds, hearts, and spirits that inviting someone to worship is like asking them to board your pet elephant for a few months. I believe that God has and will put people in your life for you to invite to join you. How to invite: don’t invite them for “sometime” but invited them for a specific Sunday until you find one that works, offer to pick them up, and suggest you go out to coffee/lunch afterwards. Did you know that 80% of people who visit and stay at a church were specifically invited by a family member or friend?

Thankful that you are here!

The balance looks good. Income was more than the expenses. We didn't have to buy bread and didn't buy as much meat this month, and the pantry hosts this month gave more than enough money to cover the cost of the eggs listed above. The pantry served 88 families, six of whom said they were there for the first time. That was 26 more households than came in August. The crew that worked did a good job making up more bags, but the stream of clients was slow and steady all evening. We only ran out of eggs, so it's good to have items left from the preceding month. One emergency bag was given in September. We thank the Woodmen of the World for a food drive they had for us the first of September. It's wonderful to have such community support. And the Mt. Clinton UMC harvested potatoes they grew for us and provided 70 five-pound bags of potatoes. Approximately 1,885 pounds of food was given in the prepacked

bags. In addition, each family was given a dozen eggs, a two-pound package of hamburger, and a loaf of bread with large families receiving two loaves. Also, items on the variety table were available. Nine people attended the last cooking class led by Elise Warmbrod from the Rockingham Extension Agency. We are hoping to make similar classes available in the spring. The Vertical Connection mobile clothes closet again provided a wonderful selection of good, clean clothes for people to take.

We thank the Clover Hill Ruritan Club and Fairview COB for hosting the distribution. Mt. Clinton UMC will host the pantry on Thursday, October 24. They will provide a dozen eggs for each family and an inspirational insert. We will plan to serve 100 in October. Collection day will be Wednesday, October 9.

Are you familiar with the Faith in Action organizations on the state and local levels? From what I have read, these groups bring a Christian perspective to

their work which often concerns social justice, and they do very good work. Someone from the local group called me about a week ago and wanted to know about our food pantry. She was just curious about what we do and how we do it. I was delighted to tell her about WRFPP (and probably told her a lot more than she needed or wanted to know!).

Although WRFPP is not part of this or any other organization, I firmly believe we, in this community, have taken seriously the teaching in James 2:17 that faith without works is dead, that faith always leads to practical action, and that trusting in God will move us to feel compassion and to help someone in need.

This pantry is an outgrowth of our faith in God, and a desire to put that faith into action to give practical help to the hungry in our community.

It was on faith that we started this pantry since none of us had any experience in this kind of project. We are not a government agency just handing out food. We try in loving, non-threatening and non-judgmental ways to demonstrate Christ's love for all of us through meeting a physical need and demonstrating concern for each individual. The pantry has grown over the past ten years, and there are evidences that there is growth in the faith of those who come to us each month. Several have shown a desire to give back to us. What a miracle to see that God has used our efforts to help "our people" to grow in their faith.


