**Open Doors**



Open Doors is a homeless shelter for those who are not eligible to stay at other shelters. It is currently operating summer shelter hours at the old Red Front grocery with beds for up to 50 guests.

During the winter shelter season, local faith communities, organizations, businesses, families, etc. provide meals for the homeless guests. Supply needs are posted weekly on their Facebook page.

On Thursday, August 19, 49 folks gathered in the fellowship hall to hear speaker, Ken Ruther-



Last month's balance was great, and this month's balance is \$483,70 more! God is good. Maybe He's telling us to save, like Joseph, during the fat years because lean years are coming. There was a little glitch with the hamburger this month. It was ordered from Kroger a couple weeks before it was needed because of its good price, but the day before the pantry, we found out they couldn't get it. Walmart came to our rescue finding enough one-pound packages for our needs, but it wasn't all the same price. The total cost turned out to be \$235.16 more than we paid last month. Thanks to Kelly Hiner, this all worked out. It's good that more families seem to be using the produce vouchers. Last month the produce bill was \$72.01. In July families received a \$4.00 voucher for grapes as well as one for \$1.40 for bananas and one for \$3.50 for apples.

The pantry served 43 households on the 4th Thursday. Deliv-

eries were made to three families, and two came to pick up groceries Saturday. These are not included in the count. Remember the story about the child picking up starfish on the beach and tossing them back into the ocean? When an adult with a practical mindset told him he wouldn't really make a difference, the child tossed back another one and said, "It made a difference to this one." We may not be reaching crowds of people, but rest assured that your generosity and work are making a difference to these families. And really, I think WRFP makes a difference to the community and has an outreach in numerous other ways. (I digress. This is a topic for more contemplation another time.) This month approximately 938 pounds of food was given in the prepacked bags.

For some time WRFP has been blessed to be part of the Cheese Ministry, and last week we received another free shipment of 15 cases of 6-pound blocks of mozzarella

cheese which will be given in August. In today's Daily News-Record the article "Meat Feast" was about a ministry to give ground beef like the Cheese Ministry. The article said that some of this ground beef had gone to a special need by Mercy House. I've been told that much of it now is going to the poorest counties in Appalachia, but WRFP is on the list to receive some in the future. We are thankful for the five freezers and two refrigerators in our storage area that allow us to take advantage of such opportunities and to save what is not used one month for distribution later. This is a special blessing since prices seem to be increasing.

In Isaiah 43, the Lord is addressing Israel, but He is also talking to us. He is reminding us that we are His, He knows our names, He has redeemed us, and through all difficulties He will be with us.

In Psalm 13, David asks "How long, O Lord? Will you forget me forever?" Do we sometimes feel like David, that God has forgotten us? Not only have we had our lives disrupted for almost two years by this pandemic, some of us have prayed for those who have suffered with the effects of COVID and mourned the loss of friends and relatives to this ravaging disease. And just when it looked as though we were going to come out of it, the delta variant, more virulent than the original virus, reared its ugly head, and here we are with the

number of infections increasing as we are approaching the time when children are going back to school, and college students are returning to campus. We do pray, "How long, O Lord?" However, we must not lose hope. Now is the time we must encourage and give hope to those who come to us in need each month. We are not giving up in our efforts to see that they have the food they need and to dispel the myths that have caused them to fear the vaccine. At the end of Psalm 13, David remembers that he has trusted in God's mercy in the

past, and he praises God because of the blessings he has received, secure in his belief that God is not giving up on him now. We too must be thankful that God has used dedicated doctors and researchers in the past to provide vaccines for small pox and polio, medicines for diabetes and shingles, progress in treatments of cancer, surgical procedures that have allowed people to regain eyesight and hearing. But as with many of God's blessings, we have to have faith enough to reach out and accept what God offers.

I asked God to help me love others as much




